**Kids Count in Michigan Data Book 2007: Profiles of County Profiles of Child Well-Being – Dec. 2007**

The health of children and youth is profoundly influenced by the physical, social and emotional context in which they live. This year the Michigan data book focuses on the health status of children and youth in Michigan, using a selected set of objectives from the national Healthy People (HP) 2010. HP 2010 identified specific priorities and measurable objectives in an effort to advance the health and well-being of the nation.
